

1 The first St Peter's was burnt to the ground by the first Queen of England

Well, almost - Empress Matilda should have been England's first Queen but her male cousin, Stephen of Blois was chosen instead. Matilda did not like this. When she and her troops came to Nottingham, she attacked the castle and set fire to the town. A new church was built in 1180. If you look up to the gallery, you can still see the original roofline.



It is made from oak gifted by the estate of Sir Nicholas Strelley in around 1480. The coat of arms of the Kempe (wheatsheaf) and Strelley (blue and white) families are displayed.

Five things you should know about St Peter's Church

Before the 1600s people rarely used seats or pews in churches (unless they were very rich). In the Georgian period box pews were popular. Families would treat them as a home from home - some had windows, curtains and even fireplaces! Box pews were installed in this church in 1785. They were later recycled and used to line the walls when new Victorian open seating replaced them.

Our windows connect us through time

The windows of St Peter's are a unique link to our past. The West Window contains decoration, known as tracery, going back to the medieval period filled with Edwardian era stained glass. Fast forward to the 21st Century and stained glass from 2007 is displayed in the Workers' Memorial Window.
