

We are now into the season of Advent, the period which is marked by the four Sundays before Christmas. Advent was originally a time of penitence, in keeping with the ancient Church tradition of preparing for the major feasts of the Christian year by a time of prayer and self-denial. It is also a time for reflecting on the themes of hope, peace, love and joy, which are one way of interpreting the four outer candles in the Advent wreath.

But what does such reflection really mean? We see Christmas as a time which should be characterised by these four qualities, but how do we square this with the brutal fact that in much of the world today there isn't much joy; peace is increasingly fragile; love is more and more superficial; and there are plenty of reasons to be pessimistic rather than hopeful about the future. Are the peace, love, joy and hope that we celebrate during the Christmas season to be merely vain longings for a utopia which we suspect will never become a reality?



At the heart of the Christian faith, however, lies the conviction that it is wrong to be fatalistic about the future, for Christians believe in a God who is total and utter Love. This is something that may be hard to understand in the abstract, but which starts to seem more real when we think in terms of the self-giving that lies at the heart of God, the source and fount of all that exists. This self-giving on the part of God reached its climax in the sending to earth of Jesus Christ, who embodied the love of God in a manner never matched before or since. This divine love shone forth from Christ in his care for the outcasts, his healing of the sick, his teachings about the way of life to which God calls us, and above all in his sacrifice of himself on the cross for the sins of the world.

This, then, is the heart of what we celebrate at Christmas – that 'God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life' (John 3.16). And this means that when we consider the horrific images of the recent massacre in Israel and the destruction of large parts of Gaza, the continuing conflict and devastation in Ukraine, the resumption of the civil war in Sudan, and as well as other wars around the world, it is so important not to conclude that there is no longer any hope for humanity. In the battle between good and evil, evil will prevail if we cease to believe in the power of good – and the power of God.

Let us, rather, be inspired by people like Maximilian Kolbe, the Polish priest who gave his life in exchange for that of a fellow prisoner in 1941 in Auschwitz; Martin Luther King, whose civil rights speeches led to massive changes in post-war USA, but also to his assassination in 1969; and Oscar Romero, the Archbishop who opposed the dictators of El Salvador and was gunned down at the altar, for speaking out, in 1980. Let us also never forget all the small but sacrificial acts of kindness which take place every day of every year, which are rays of light in a world where more and more people seem to be struggling to maintain even a simple lifestyle which is safe and free from anxiety about food, fuel costs, or housing needs.

There are, therefore, signs of hope, and there is always hope if we remain firm in our faith in the God who cares for each individual, and whose Son Jesus Christ came to the world to share our life and to bring love, mercy and justice to this troubled world. This is the heart of the Christmas message; that God is with us and has not just abandoned the world to those who would divide and destroy it. Indeed, this is the meaning of the ancient Hebrew word 'Emmanuel', God with us.

As we worship God in the many services in our churches during the Advent and Christmas season, let us therefore ponder on all the various ways in which we can join with others in making real our belief that God is with us. God needs each one of us, and wants to use our hands, our feet, our hearts and our minds in his service.

A happy and blessed Christmas to you all.



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All Saints' Day celebrations

All Saints' day this year saw all three congregations gathered together at the 10.30 a.m. service. The Nottingham Enlightening Word Church has been meeting for seven years now with growing numbers. Members of their young music group sang for us accompanied by piano and violin. St Gabriel's (Eritrean) Church are reaching their first anniversary in December. They also have large numbers of young families who are taught the traditions of their orthodox faith. They sang for us accompanied by drums. Awtsana Misghna told us about their faith and style of worship.

I just want to say welcome and we are so glad to be part of this ceremony. In the next 3 to 5 minutes I will give you a brief history about the Eritrean Orthodox Christian Church, our church. Christianity entered Eritrea and Ethiopia (which were called the Aksumite kingdom under the King of Ezana) in the 4th century (347 AD). The Christian faith was first introduced and preached by a man called Abu Salama (father of peace) through the Red Sea. Abu Salama was originally from Syria but he was born in Greece. Christianity then spread to the whole region, specifically to the Tigrinya


speaking people majority in living in the highlands (KEBESA). We believe in the Trinity and worship One God. We have a huge respect for Saints and we occasionally name a church with their name. For example, our church is named after Saint Gabriel. We get service from deacons and priests. Every child is baptised after 40 and 80 days, boys and girls respectively. Holy Communion/ the Lord's Supper is prepared only by the priest in the name of Jesus, and children and the elderly eat it from the hands of the priest. When an adult has done any sin, they tell the priest and confess all, then they receive the Lord's Supper. This is completely confidential and kept secret. We pray to glorify our God and receive mercy for our sins. We have a big ark called Tabot made in wood. We use this in the prayer time in special occasions and this holds the 10 commandments of God. It is only held by the priest. We use different cultural instruments like drum,

xinha (I do not know in English) to sing and glorify God. All of us have to wear a white sheet (Nexela) when we come to church. The white colour is a sign of purity and cleanliness. "If any of you want to come with me, you must forget yourself, carry your cross, and follow me" Jesus said. We have a cross hung round our neck normally tied by a piece of cotton. This is due to the above quote. Thank you for listening.


